Just like the Musketeers, this slogan could also be the battle cry for ASTAC. As a cooperative, we are dedicated to enhancing broadband access for ALL our members, in ALL communities, not just those who have the benefit of a fiber optic connection. Membership in any ASTAC community contributes to

and strengthens the cooperative as a whole (ONE).

Admittedly, over the past few years we have focused efforts preparing our fiber fed markets, but we are now moving to enhance our services in our "final four" markets. The villages of Kaktovik, Atqasuk, Anaktuvuk Pass, and Point Lay are all scheduled to be upgraded in 2019. The reality of a satellite connection has not changed, but ASTAC has decided to invest in making satellite service better. This summer we will be moving our service to a new satellite and installing new dishes and modern electronics in each market. These changes will increase both the reliability and overall bandwidth that is shared by those communities. These upgrades will have a noticeable improvement to both the home Internet and wireless services we provide.

In 2015, our Board of Directors passed a resolution which fully supports connecting all ASTAC markets. ASTAC has also been working on a long-term solution for these markets, and that is to get off satellite and move to terrestrial service. These projects will extend capacity from a nearby fiber fed market to the more remote community via overland fiber optic cables or modern microwave systems. ASTAC has spent the last year developing detailed construction plans to connect both Kaktovik and Atqasuk and are actively pursuing grant funding to help make these projects a reality.

Our sincere thanks go out to all of you that have provided letters of support and comments supporting our recent grant applications and we will continue to work hard to make them ALL a reality. It's this unstoppable loyalty to ONE another, like the credo of the Musketeers, this solidarity is what binds us together and is the driving force behind ASTAC.







In April, ASTAC's business and enterprise team traveled to Utqiaġvik and hosted two launch events at the Inupiat Heritage Center for our new company, ASTAC Broadband, LLC. The company was created earlier this year to distinguish it from our Local Exchange Carrier (LEC) company and will be used by the enterprise sales team when soliciting non-LEC services. FIBER TO THE HOME – UTQIAĠVIK

Fiber is coming to Utqiaġvik! In April we began scheduling installations by zone and will continue throughout August 2019. During the install, ASTAC technicians will bring the fiber into your home and change out your existing equipment with a free GigaCenter (wireless router with built-in WiFi). This equipment along with the new fiber connection will allow ASTAC to deliver faster data speeds throughout your home. Current and new customers can preregister for installation on our web site.

WHAT'S DIFFERENT ABOUT FIBER TO THE HOME?

- Performance is not limited by distance or interference and is not shared bandwidth like cable. Currently the further away you are from our Central Office, the harder it is to provide a constant connection or speed; this fixes it!
- Capacity What's capacity? Sometimes the information highway is clogged because it's not big enough for all the data – movies, photos, music, games – to flow through. Fiber increases the 'information highway', also known as the capacity of your Internet connection.
- There's less time buffering and more time video chatting, uploading family videos and playing your favorite online games. Just click and you're there!
