midday, and the other in the early evening. We would always rise early, spend hours flying between villages, with just enough time to get set up before members began to arrive. After the meeting, we would hustle back to the plane and zip on to the next village for the evening meeting. Some years the weather was perfect, with light winds to keep the mosquitoes down, and everything went like clockwork. In other years, flights were delayed, the fog was thick as concrete, planes had mechanical issues, and frantic rescheduling took place over the phone, updating members over the VHF.

There was always something that made each trip particularly memorable and they were always a great adventure for me. It was this adventure that I missed most in 2020.

As a result of COVID-19, the ASTAC annual meetings were postponed from the normal July window as we monitored to see how the virus would impact our plans. Finally, as October approached, we had to commit to a virtual meeting format, and per our Bylaws, we had to complete the meetings by December. In many ways the scramble was familiar, setting up web pages for registration, learning to use Zoom (ahh Zoom!) to present powerpoints, videos, election results and Bylaw amendments.

DALTON HIGHWAY LTE SITES



ASTAC turned up three new 4G LTE sites in late December making it the first telecommunications company to bring wireless coverage from the Brooks Range to Deadhorse, where no other coverage had existed previously. These sites will improve safety and connectivity along this remote 414-mile critical Alaskan corridor for both

ASTAC and AT&T wireless customers. ASTAC plans to turn up three additional sites on the Dalton Highway this year.

One hundred and thirty-one ASTAC members participated in their community's Annual Meeting in December. ELECTION RESULTS

Director elections in Anaktuvuk Pass, Kaktovik and Wainwright were held in November. Pearl Burris of Anaktuvuk Pass, Carla SimsKayotuk of Kaktovik and Isabel Nashookpuk of Wainwright were all re-elected to three-year terms. Included on the ballot was a Bylaw amendment increasing board compensation. The amendment passed with 67.7% voting for and 32.3% voting against it.

Of 2,007 eligible members, 163 ballots were cast yielding an 8.12% participation rate

ASTAC WINS USDA GRANT

In November the USDA announced it awarded ASTAC with a \$5.3M grant as part of its RUS Rural E-Connectivity (Reconnect) program. ASTAC will match the grant with our own \$2M investment to expand our network to provide customers in Kaktovik with access to affordable highspeed broadband. Fiber to the Home work will begin this summer, but the tower construction activities will not begin until next winter for the Camden Bay Tower. Services in the community will begin in the summer of 2022.

Chief Network Officer Charlie Carpenter retired on December 31, 2020, after more than 17 years with ASTAC. Charlie has been an integral part of ASTAC's Operations team as they have supported our cooperative's network evolution, including Fiber to the Home, IP switching and 4G LTE projects.
